#### SULGRAVE NATURE NOTES

#### Australian Daisies and other flowers

Many years ago I was driving in to bush to Kalguli, Western Australia; we were miles from anywhere but the sides of the road was littered with beer cans. I said to my host that it seemed astonishing that Australians seemed so indifferent to their environment. 'Oh, they just chuck them out – we call them Australian Daisies,' Recently going down Magpie Road to the village, I picked up 24 Budweiser and other assorted beer cans, as well as several plastic bottles; how times have changed!

#### Orchids

This one was a good one for orchids. We had a few more common and Southern Marsh Orchids, but no Bee or Early Purple Orchids. Chris and Janet Whiteman came to have a look at our Hay Meadows in May and were interested in the Orchids. They asked if we had any White Orchids: I replied that there were no native White Orchids, although there were some white Helleborines; since checking my reference books I find the Greater Butterfly Orchid is white. Ten days later I was walking through the hay meadow and found a white orchid; God moves in mysterious ways! I asked Janet Cropley to have a look at it and we came to the conclusion it was a Common Orchid that was white!

#### Ravens

I heard Crows making a lot of noise and saw them dive bombing another bird which was eating a dead lamb; I presumed it was a Buzzard. The affair resumed that afternoon and I walked down to have a closer look – the crows flew away and then a great black crow took off with the sun shining on the luxuriant sheen of its feathers and I realised it was a raven. I have never seen one here before, although I thought I had heard some curious croaks high in the sky! I have since discovered that they nest here and presume they must have come from Wales.

#### Hornets

A queen Hornet came into our bedroom in the Spring and I encouraged it out of the window! In the summer we had plenty of hornets on our fruit. This is only the second summer running that I have seen English Hornets here!

#### Badgers

Badgers destroyed at least three Bumble Bee nests this year.

#### **Grey Squirrels**

For some reason these pests have been particularly destructive in the last two years ripping the bark of a nice 20 foot walnut and several similar sized field maples. Trees with smooth bark such as limes, sycamores, ash and the leaders of oak are attractive to these creatures with dire results for the tree.
