Halelujah! At long last we have a brand-new, fully-functioning air-conditioner in the shop. Just in time for the Winter. Actually it doubles as a heater so volunteers will no longer need to bring their own fan heaters when the mercury plummets.

The upward trend in overall sales continues though there has been a substantial drop in tobaccos sales - so maybe the new rules about keeping cigarettes hidden from view is having an impact. Two bargains to look out for this month are a classy Saumur (a delicious chenin-blanc from the Loire) and 'Campeador' a stunning Burgundy-like Rioja Crianza from Northern Spain. Unfortunately both were available only in small quantities so grab a bottle before we run out.

On the food front we have a few new lines including 'Tom's Pies - chicken, ham-hock and leek', 'Soulful One-Pot pulled-pork stew with chorizo, beans and spelt' (how hipster is that?) and a fancy five-cheese sauce from Mattarello. We also have a sticky ginger cake and a new fruit cake for you to try with your morning coffee. And don't forget that the freezer is always well-stocked with fresh fish, fish dishes and delicious vegetarian meals.

With new items coming on line almost every week, products that have been on the shelves for some time often end up in the 'bargain basket' so make sure you have a rummage to see if you can find anything of interest. Towards the end of the month watch out for Halloween special offers and pumpkins for the kids to carve.

High Adventure in Mongolia

A slide show by Hywel Lloyd

This is the story of a team of British Alpinists, including Ingram and Hywel, who went to the Altai mountains in western Mongolia. We used jeeps and camels to trek for 8 days into the high peaks, meeting fascinating local people. From our base camp next to the Potamin glacier, we climbed Malchin (4037m / 13,245ft) which is on the Mongolian border with Russia.

Then we camped high on the glacier at 3660m / 12,008ft and – despite two nights of ferocious storms from Siberia – we found a break in the weather to gain the three snow and ice summits of Khuiten (4374m / 14,350ft). It was a superb adventure to visit the highest peak in Mongolia.

Paschendaele

The 3rd battle of Ypres, often referred to as the Battle of Paschendaele (a small village NE of Ypres) took place between 31st July and 6th November 1917. Of shorter duration than the Somme in 1916, it was no less bloody and even muddier. Just after the start the rain came and kept on and on. Artillery barrages had broken all the drain and churned up the ground into thousands of shell holes which soon became an absolute quagmire. My father, George, was a limber driver in the Machine Corps, delivering ammunition and general supplies to his squadron of 12 Vickers heavy machine guns. As these could easily use up 250,000 rounds of .303 in a day when "busy", this could be a hectic occupation as well as hazardous. Movement near the front, if observed by the enemy, would bring a few "whizbangs" - heavy mortar shells from a "Nebelwerfer" or trench mortar. Often deliveries had to be made at night to avoid such a greeting. Eventually, the travelling became so bad that the limbers could no longer be used, supplies being carried on pack horses. Each driver would ride one horse and lead another laden with panniers of ammunition. The detours to avoid the worst of the mud and water filled shell holes meant that the distances were too great for a man to walk leading two pack horses - he would undoubtedly have been caught in the open in daylight and subjected to a hail of missiles.

On one occasion, George was taking 18 powder shells to a Royal Field Artillery battery associated with his squadron of machine guns. Arriving back at base after delivery he was given a mug of rum, two fresh horses and ordered back to the battery as fast as possible, he had a load of 18 powder fuses, insufficient had been sent initially. Already getting light as he approached the battery with this second load, he luckily avoided the storm of missiles sent over by the observant enemy and staying under cover with the battery all day, he returned safely to base the next night.

The battle of Paschendaele ended with the capture of the ruins of the little Belgian village by Canadian troops.
