### WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE.....

The gales, rainstorms and tidal surges which have battered Britain in recent weeks and caused such flooding and damage in many parts of the country may be signs of climate change, and it seems likely that they are foretasters of what we can expect more frequently in the future. So what can we do about it? Well, if, as most weather experts believe, this is largely the consequence of man's activities, then it may be too late to take effective measures to avoid such weather extremes.

However, perhaps some of the worst results can be avoided if our attitudes towards land management change. Take flooding, for example. Hitherto, the plan has been to drain water off the land as quickly as possible, by digging ever-deeper ditches., straightening streams, removing waterside vegetation and so on. The result is to create problems lower down, where drains can't deal with sudden violent rushes of water, and flooding ensues. This is aggravated by practices such as building on water meadows and flood-plains, and is worst in built-up areas where so much of the land surface is covered in concrete or tarmac. It is now being realised that it's better to let the rainwater seep away gradually into the ground, releasing it slowly. The old water-meadows – natural soakaways – were essential to this process. Better flooded fields that flooded homes, surely?

We are fortunate, here in Sulgrave, insofar as we are generally free from serious flooding (although I know that some houses, especially those with cellars, do sometimes have trouble). There is a reason for this - it's in the lie of the land. If you walk along the road from here to Culworth, you'll see that the road rises gently as far as the Magpie Farm, and then gradually falls again towards Culworth. Believe it or not, this slight rise is part of one of the most important geographical features of south-eastern England. It's major watershed, separating two great river systems. On the Sulgrave side, all the water drains eastward. Our little streams form the Rive Tow (or Tove), which eventually joins the Great Ouse on its way via Bedford to flow into the Wash at King's Lynn. In Culworth parish, all the water flows into the Cherwell and then south to join the Thames at Oxford. So, living here in what are sometimes referred to as the Northamptonshire Uplands, we are unlikely to experience any inconvenient flooding worse than a little water gathering in a dip in the road. We mustn't be smug or unsympathetic, however - our heavy rain is someone else's problem!

### Warning after scam continues to affect people in Northamptonshire

The phone scam encourages residents to part with bank details including pin numbers and banks cards. During the scam the offender calls the resident, purporting to be a police officer, investigating a fraud on their bank account, a fraud investigator from a bank or other bank official. They then ask for account information, including their card numbers, security number and pin number. If the resident becomes suspicious, the offender suggests that they call 999 or 101 and ask for confirmation that the person is a police officer. The victim then calls police, but doesn't realise that the offender has not hung up so goes straight through to them again. The offender then obtains all their details

More recently there has been a variation on the original theme, the caller will request that the victim go to their bank to withdraw money or simply instruct the victim to transfer an amount of money into a specific bank account.

This scam has come close to home. Within the last couple of weeks a resident of Sulgrave became a victim of this crime. Luckily she became suspicious and contacted the police. However, people in Middleton Cheney were defrauded of  $\pounds 5000$ .

## Never give your card details, PIN or bank card to anyone

Report any incidents to the police. Always call 999 if the crime is in action.



Nature Watch



## Draft Notes from Parish Council Meeting held 9th January 2014

### To approve and sign the minutes of last meeting held on 14<sup>th</sup> November 2013

The minutes were approved and accepted by the council.

## To discuss and agree the setting of the precept for 2014/15

The Parish Clerk had circulated an income and expenditure sheet for the current year. The biggest items of expenditure continue to be street lighting, grass cutting, clerks salary and insurance.

The Chair proposed that the precept be set at £11,575.00 plus 2% which equals £11,807.00. This was seconded by ClIr Russell. All the councillors voted in favour.

### <u>Councillors Reports</u>

The Chair reported that the application for the Community Spaces grant for Pocket Park was successful and they have secured £2K in funding. Proposed purchase items are a marquee, generator, lights, barbecue and fuel. This grant was to celebrate the open space of Pocket Park. An email confirmation was received on  $16^{th}$  December but no formal notification has been received. The event, Community Carol Singing was held at Pocket Park on  $20^{th}$  December of which there are photos on the website. There was no equipment for this event as the money had not been received.

### Finance Report

The following payments were approved:-£30.00 to Parish Clerk (contribution to broadband costs) £83.32 to EON (street lighting maintenance) £210.47 to EON (electricity) These payments were proposed by Cllr Pollak and seconded by Cllr Powell.

#### Planning Applications

Three applications had been received since the last meeting:-

- S/2013/1485/FUL, Single storey rear extension and rear garden shed, metal railings and gates at front at the Old Wesleyan Chapel, Manor Road. No objections raised.
  Approval has been given now.
- 2. S/2013/1575/FUL, Single storey rear extension and conversion of outbuilding to form studio at the Old Forge, Church Street. Objections raised. Awaiting final decision.
- 3. S/2013/1589/FUL, Variation of condition 2 of planning permission S/2013/0077/FUL (Variation of condition 2 of planning permission S/2012/0489/FUL (four dwellings with garages and new garage for Belmont House) to add a conservation roof light to plot 3 at Belmont, Little Street. Awaiting final decision.
