

Wild flowers? - we love them. Weeds? - we hate them. Wild flowers - good. Weeds? - bad. Such a clear-cut distinction, quite commonly held, is however difficult to justify. It all depends on what is meant by a weed. Broadly speaking, it's a plant that's in the wrong place, but one's view on this varies according to where one is standing. One person's weed may very well be someone else's delight. A good example of this is the poppy. To the arable farmer, the poppy is certainly a weed and, as such, has been almost completely banished from the cornfield. Yet I am sure that many of us are uplifted to see the occasional field where the poppy has been allowed to present that wonderful blaze of red. The poppy has survived the widespread use of herbicides simply because of the long-lasting viability of its seeds. Less fortunate have been the cornflower (now found almost only as garden annual), the corn marigold and other "weeds" of arable land. The traditional hay-meadow with its rich mix of grasses and herbs, has well-nigh disappeared (if you want to see something of what we're missing, visit Swaledale, in Yorkshire, in June. Lovely!)

Some wild flowers are deemed to be sufficiently attractive to be welcomed into our gardens; examples include the cowslip, the primrose and the (British native) bluebell. Others, while not perhaps particularly beautiful, have all sorts of uses, medicinal or other. The leaves of the dandelion make a useful addition to salads - I've even seen packets of dandelion seeds on sale in France!

It's not only the colourful or the useful plants which have an important role to play. Many of the wild flowers are small and fairly unobtrusive. A recent not-too-expert or comprehensive survey of our churchyard produced a total of 37 species of wild flower in bloom (of which the list may be seen on the notice board in the church porch). All of them are important in the overall scheme of things, being interdependent on each other. What may look to the human eye as an untidy patch of weedy vegetation is in fact a living community. There'll be all sorts of small creatures who live there. That clump of nettles – some of our most beautiful butterflies (the peacock, the red admiral, the painted lady, the small tortoiseshell.....) lay their eggs there, and the caterpillars of others (the meadow brown, the gatekeeper, the ringlet.....) live on various grasses. Destroy that habitat, and there'll be repercussions; fewer butterflies, for one thing. The small areas of "wild flower meadow" in the churchyard, the Pocket Park and Castle Green are an attempt to give nature a hand. Now and then there'll be quiet times when nothing colourful seems to be flowering there. There a things going on there all the same.

This is not a recommendation to let the garden go entirely wild, or the cornfield to be thick with undesirables. It is however a suggestion that it's not a bad thing if some areas, here and there are left to nature.

Footnote
