Jingle Bells, Jingle Bells... Yes – the festive season is upon us again and the shop is well geared up to cope with the inevitable Christmas rush.

In no particular order, we have a great range of Christmas wrapping paper, bags and tags, tissue paper and cards; lots of new sweet treats including "choc-shots on a stick", "meringue drops" in lots of delicious flavours and gorgeous Italian nougat slices stuffed with fruits and berries. There are also bottles of Belvoir mulled Christmas punch and winter cordial and Whittards' hot chocolate gift packs.

On the savoury counter, in addition to a range of great cheeses, there are cheese straws and an assortment of snacks and nibbles to accompany your pre-dinner glass(es) of wine.

Digby never thought that managing the wine shelves would provide him with such a good physical work-out. Apart from regularly humping cases of wine up and down the steps into his cellar, he has been pushing a wheel-barrow full of wine around to the shop almost every day in an attempt to keep up with consumption. So thank you drinkers of Sulgrave for improving my fitness. We regularly feed new lines into our range of wines so keep a weather eye on the shelves for new bargains. We have noted in the past that customers could be a little more adventurous with their wine purchases. It is clear from sales figures that many folks tend to choose wines made from grapes that they are familiar with - such as 'Sauvignon Blanc' or 'Pinot Grigio'. Why not branch out and give some of the others a try? We have good examples of Riesling, Muscadet and Chenin Blanc amongst the whites and we stock wines made from a wide range of red grape varieties. Go on – be daring.

Once again the shop is putting on a **Christmas tasting** of assorted goodies and we shall be offering freshly roasted chestnuts at the door – so wrap up well and get there early to be at the front of the queue **at 10 am on Saturday 2nd December**. Christmas opening times will be posted on the door so check there to see when we are open. At present we hope to only close on 25th and 26th and again on Monday 1st January with early closing on Friday 29th to allow stock taking to take place.

Christmas order forms are available in the shop, so if you haven't yet placed your orders for the festive table you had better get on with it.

SATURDAY 21 OCTOBER - INAUGURAL ORGAN RECITAL St James the Less

We are sure those of you who were at the concert will agree we had a wonderful evening, and those who weren't missed something special.

Our organist, Ian Tracey, was simply marvellous. He spoke about each piece he was going to play, explaining what particular sounds we should listen for. He was most amusing and enlightening and an astonishing musician who showed off the organ to the full and really pulled out all the stops.

In spite of the fact that Ian usually plays the organ in Liverpool Cathedral which has 5 manuals (keyboards), 200 stops and over 10,000 pipes, and ours has 2 manuals, 15 stops and a mere 593 pipes, he was most complimentary about our lovely Binns organ and, indeed, confirmed that one of the reasons he agreed to come and play for us was because it has such a good reputation.

The church was practically full to capacity and after the concert we all gathered for drinks and delicious canapés.

Not only did the evening raise just over £3,000 for our fund, which brings us very close to our total of £40,000, but we have fulfilled our scholarship requirement for the present time and have appointed our first student organist. Thanks to all the support we received, it was a most successful evening.

The breathing charity is a publicly funded charity providing breathing monitoring equipment for children and babies suffering with respiratory problems.

Sara Louise Brown (Tuesday 19th 14 Spinners Cottages) has asked if this year's Advent Calendar collection can support this small charity which has helped them so much. She writes:

"They have been a god send to us. Earlier this year, when we were sent home from hospital with no apnoea equipment for 4 week old Ida, no medical explanation or support and only basic CPR training, we called NARA on the very night we were discharged. With no hesitation, the lovely lady that runs the charity brought us an apnoea monitor round—this was 9pm on a Saturday night!

As Ida had stopped breathing numerous times in her sleep previously, there was no way I would have slept without one of these monitors! They saved us a fortune and saved our little one's life... It alarmed on 4 separate occasions and I was woken from a deep sleep and able to get Ida breathing again. Thankfully we haven't needed to use it in a long time but the charity has insisted we keep it for a few more months for our own peace of mind. A truly amazing little charity."

Summary of the Parish Council Meeting: 2nd November 2017

To keep villagers updated on the work of the Parish Council, we will publish a summary of each meeting in the following month's newsletter.

The November meeting was well attended by villagers who raised a number of issues during public participation. In particular, a concern was raised that there were a number of places in the village where plants and trees were overhanging footpaths creating safety issues. With the cold weather and shorter days already here, villagers are asked to cut back overhanging tree branches and plants so that pedestrians do not have to walk on the roads or slippery verges.

Council business discussed at the meeting included: Replacing the bus shelter; Pocket Park maintenance; grass cutting; HS2; Neighbourhood Watch; and the 2018/19 budget.

Replacing the Bus Shelter - The existing shelter has been in place for over sixty years and will become structurally unsafe eventually. Its replacement has been an agenda item for the Council for a number of years. In July, villagers chose a new shelter to replace the existing one. Council discussed the cost of replacing the existing shelter and agreed to apply to use the remaining New Homes Bonus Grant to part fund the new shelter, while the Sulgrave History Society offered to contribute financially to the project. It was agreed there are insufficient reserves to draw upon and the whole shortfall cannot be added to the precept. It was agreed that Council would investigate funding the remaining costs through a public works loan. Councillor Daniels continues to lead on this project.

<u>Pocket Park</u> - Councillor North provided an update on maintenance carried out at the Pocket Park. It was agreed that the hedging work carried out by Mr Richard Fonge last year would be continued and would commence in December. Council agreed to a proposal by Mr Fonge to purchase a mower and fund more regular grass cutting for the Pocket Park. The total cost of acquiring the mower and grass cutting will be added to the Parish Council's 2018 budget.

<u>Grass Cutting</u> - The grass cutting contractor has advised they will be unable to continue with the contract from the end of the season. Council will now undertake a tender to appoint a new contractor.

<u>HS2</u> - Following the successful HS2 consultation visit to Sulgrave in October, Council discussed and adopted a strategy to ensure that villagers were kept up to date with HS2 developments throughout the design and construction process. Council will keep villagers up to date through this newsletter, the village website and on the notice board as information on the progress of HS2 becomes available.

Once more information comes to hand, Council will arrange another information event. Counsellor Faure will attend the SNC HS2 Liaison meetings. The Parish Council is strongly committed to working with villagers to try to mitigate the impact of HS2 on the village.

Neighbourhood Watch - Council discussed and agreed the benefits of a Neighbourhood Watch scheme in the village. While it was noted that Neighbourhood Watch schemes are moving more online, if we are to establish a scheme in the village, we will require a Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator. To date, there have been no volunteers for the position of Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator. Council will be seeking a Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator over the coming weeks.

<u>Other business</u> - Council discussed setting the 2018/19 budget. Council agreed to keep the 2018 precept as low as possible by limiting increases. The 2018/19 budget will be decided next meeting.

As there is traditionally no Parish Council meeting in December, the next meeting will be in January 2018. At this meeting, Council plans to receive an update on the bus shelter project, set the precept for 2018/19 and receive an update on HS2 and Improvements to the Church Hall.

Replacing the Bus Shelter

The existing shelter has been in place for over sixty years and will become structurally unsafe eventually. Its replacement has been an agenda item for the Council for a number of years. The current Council has committed to progressing this project so that the residents of Sulgrave and surrounding villages who use the bus shelter have an appropriate amenity. This project also gives us the opportunity to create a sheltered guide for visitors to the village.

In July, villagers chose a new shelter to replace the existing one. While the chosen option was the biggest, it was also the most expensive. Council has agreed to apply to use the remaining New Homes Bonus Grant to, in part, fund the new shelter, while the Sulgrave History Society has also offered to contribute financially to the project. As Council does not wish to add the whole funding shortfall to the precept, it was agreed that Council would investigate funding the remaining costs through a public works loan.

A public works loan for the outstanding amount would add a maximum of £353 onto the precept in 2018 and each year for the next 13.5 years. It equates to a 2.6% increase on last year's precept. This, in turn would mean an increase in parish precept per Band D property of £1.72.

The Parish Council is committed to improving amenities in the village for all villagers. We feel that replacing the bus shelter and funding this through a combination of New Homes Bonus Grant and a public works loan offers the best and most responsible approach for replacing this important piece of village infrastructure. The Parish Council would like to hear your views. If you would like to comment, please contact one of our Parish Councillors. You can do this by phone, email or in person. Their contact details are available on the Sulgrave village website.

Renovation of the Church Hall

The Parish Council and the Parochial Church Council are working together on a proposal to renovate the Church Hall. The hope is to fund this work through an application to the HS2 Community and Environment Fund, administered by Groundwork. We are currently developing ideas and proposals based on drawings & measurements prepared by Andrew Waite and have had a builder come to view the hall. We've discussed potential improvements with him and he is going to provide us with an initial estimate to inform our bid.

The maximum amount we can apply for under the Community and Environment Fund is £75,000. There is no deadline to make the application, however, we will be moving forwards on this as swiftly as possible.

We are keen to hear your views on the proposed renovation, what you think should be done with the hall and where we should prioritise the funding we manage to secure. We may not be able to do all we wish, but we want to make best use of whatever funding we get.
