A gradual shift in the sales of white to red wines is a sure sign that colder weather is just around the corner though we should still have a few weeks of the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness remaining before we submit to winter's icy grip.

Last month the shop held its Annual General Meeting in the church hall and there was a good turnout of members of the association. The committee was re-elected en masse though sadly Joy Grice has decided to stand down as facilities officer. Joy has done an excellent job and will be much missed though she will continue to give active support to the shop. The chairman noted that the shop celebrated its fifteenth birthday this year and, since its inauguration, has achieved a turnover of approximately two million pounds. For a tiny shop in a small village, run largely by volunteers, this is quite an achievement.

However (there is always a 'however') our insurers have recently stated that there must be at least two people on duty in the shop at all times and this has greatly increased the demands on our volunteers. I am sure that many customers are not aware of the huge amount of time and effort required to keep things running so efficiently but without the constant input of volunteers, the shop would not survive. Although we have quite a lot of people on the list, most of the work is done by a small handful of dedicated regulars who each contribute many hours of their time every week. They are happy to do so but we often face the problem of unfilled shifts and one of these saintly souls then has to be called upon to step in and give up even more of their time. So this is a plea to all villagers to step up to the plate and volunteer to help. One shift per week behind the till would be a big help and two would be a Godsend. Operating the till is not rocket science and any newbe would be mentored by Natasha, Jeanette or an experienced volunteer until they were fully confident. So come on folks - do your little bit for the community and help to keep our wonderful shop alive.

For two years running, Sulgrave Village Shop has made it through to the regional finals of the Countryside Alliance Awards. Although we have been highly commended, we have just missed being selected as best village shop in the midlands. We shall be applying again this year and will be pulling out all the stops to reach the national finals. The judges rely a great deal on nominations from the public so the more recommendations they receive, the better our chances. There are quite a few new lines appearing this month including some cracking new wines and some posh flavoured rye crisps from Aarne & Elsa. Most of our cheeses now come from Wychwood Fine Foods who cut and pre-pack them for us in various sizes (you can order bigger pieces if you want them) - and the shop stocks a great selection of savoury biscuits to serve with them. There are also lots of super new greetings cards on the racks maintaining the shop's reputation for having the best card selection in the region.


MIND/Prostate Cancer

I have recently completed my Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award and this year I decided to complete my Silver Duke of Edinburgh. After telling people that I was planning on completing my second award I was made aware that the Sulgrave charities had a fund which was intended to be spent on children who lived in the village. The Sulgrave charities kindly gave me a donation towards the cost of the expedition. I completed my practise expedition during storm Hannah in April'19 and camped for a total of 3 nights

and 3 days in the Dark peak. The weather was terrible and it rained continuously throughout the whole duration and made putting up our tents and cooking very difficult. However our qualifying expedition was also 3nights and 3 days but in the White peak, and was the complete opposite to storm Hannah. Over the 3days we had full sun, blue sky and 30° temperatures, which compared to the practise expedition was a dream, although on the last night we reached our campsite and there was no water supply, toilets or showers as the local villagers had a water pipe burst so we weren't best pleased. Over the 2 awards I have learnt how to work in a team, basic skills, the countryside code and most importantly how not to panic when walking through a field full of inquisitive bulls! I would definitely recommend completing any of the awards to anyone as you learn so many skills and it's such a fun and amazing experience where you create so many memories and build so many friendships whilst achieving something which will look so good on your CV in the future.

Before giving the answer to last month's question about "Hobarts Funnies", apologies to all who puzzled over the options. I'm sorry to say that the correct answer was omitted from the list.

Now the explanation!

The **SWIMMING TANK** was the SHERMAN with added buoyancy and two propellers. The **CROCODILE** was a CHURCHILL carrying a flame thrower.

The **FASCINE CARRIER**, again a CHURCHILL carrying a huge bundle of branches to be rolled off into anti tank ditches in order to drive over.

The **MOBILE BRIDGE** was carried on the hull of an obsolete VALENTINE tank.

The **BOBBIN** was a rolled up flexible roadway carried by the CHURCHILL for use on soft ground.

The **CRAB** and the **FLAIL** were mine clearance devices carried by the SHERMAN and the CHURCHILL respectively.

The **DUSTBIN THROWER** was a very large mortar carried in place of the usual main gun of a CHURCHILL. At short range it demolished concrete emplacements.

Summary of the Parish Council Meeting: 5th September 2019

Election of Chairperson

Will Priestman agreed to act as chair for this meeting

Co-option of New Councillor

Richard Fonge agreed to be co-opted as a member of the Council.

The minutes of the meeting held on 4th July 2019 were accepted as a true record.

Any matters arising

There were no matters arising

Update on HS2

Andrew Dixon summarised the history of the PCC's grant application to HS2 and the conditions they had specified when they awarded £75,000 to pay for refurbishments to the Church Hall. He described the latest information given to him by the Diocese of Peterborough. He was hopeful that the Diocese was working on an innovative solution, but was awaiting detail.

Councillor Responsibility for Bus Service Liaison and Village Shop Liaison Richard Fonge agreed to be responsible for the bus service liaison and Laura North will be liaison with the village shop.

Trees by the Stocks

Neil had received quotes to carry out work on the trees by the stocks. The quotation from Cotefield Treecare was accepted. Work is scheduled to begin on the 24th September. The contractors will remove some of the lower branches to raise the crown of the trees and thin out branches. They will also ensure that branches do not snag the telephone wires currently running through the trees.

There are other trees requiring attention in Manor Road- Tow Rise and Church Street

Update on the VAS

There is some money available via the OPFC and a 22 point checklist has been emailed through. There does not have to be match funding. A letter of support has been received from a villager on Helmdon Road. Work will continue in trying to secure funding.

SNC Electronic Planning Consultation

SNC are looking to introduce electronic planning applications. This means that no hard copies would be posted out. Parishes are invited to order a laptop, projector and screen to help with the transition and training will be organised. These items will be funded by the New Homes Bonus Grant. It was agreed to order a laptop, projector and screen. The Parish Clerk will make the application.

Local Community Bus Service

Representative from Ability Northants attended PC meeting in July. The Parish Clerk has received confirmation from SNC that they can apply for the £500.00 fee via the New Homes Bonus Grant. It was agreed to proceed with the service. The Parish Clerk will make the application.

Finance

The following payments were approved: £35.50 to Texprep (newsletter printing) £203.57 to EON (electricity) £82.80 to John Hicks (Pocket Park inspection) £650.00 to D North (work to bus shelter) £20.00 to SNAST (Neighbourhood Watch) £234.20 To Parish Clerk (hours) £13.60 To HMRC £19.35 to Parish Clerk (mileage) £79.62 to Texprep (newsletter printing) £36.00 to CPRE (membership)

A copy of the unaudited village shop accounts for the period 31st December 2018 to 31st March 2019 was passed to the Clerk for filing. A profit payment of £145.00 will be given to the Parish Council.

Planning applications received before the meeting

No update was given

Correspondence

Several items of correspondence were highlighted:

- The UK Cycling Event takes place on Saturday 19th October and there be cyclists going through the village. It is not a big event and there will be no road closures.
- Villager, Trees and Pocket Park Pocket Parks were created to become nature reserves. Every tree and shrub planted within the park and neighbouring wood is a British Native although there is one exception. It was agreed to take note of these comments and not plant the trees in Pocket Park.

• The second phase of restoration work will begin on Sulgrave Manor in late October. An out building will be re-roofed, but most other works will be internal - electrics, heating, plastering and decoration. The site will be closed to visitors apart from advertised dates and pre booked activities. There are details on the website and Facebook. There may be occasional disruption to phone/email services for the Manor while systems are upgraded

Public participation session

Richard Fonge thanked Julian Antony for his help with the pond area in Pocket Park. A dip on the left has been filled with seven tonnes of top soil and grass seed put on. The area has been mowed for the first time and will start to improve. There is one dead tree and others to be cut down. A working party will be arranged.

It was noted there is a lorry parked outside the shop on a regular basis that is damaging the verge.

HS2 site walk and Q&A session.
