Oh dear – it has not been a good month. The first sad news is that Anne Allan will be stepping down as co-supervisor of the Shop at the end of April. Anne has been a brilliant addition to the Shop staff and has improved shop operation enormously. She will be hugely missed. The committee will be recruiting to find a replacement in the near future.

As you will all undoubtedly be aware, the Shop was broken into yet again in the early hours of Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> February. The shop was ram-raided with a stolen vehicle and the thieves tried to remove the Post Office safe. Thankfully, they were unsuccessful, only getting away with the shop till containing just over £100, but caused a great deal of damage to the door frame and the shop interior.

As was the case in the past, the incident has imposed a huge amount of extra work on the committee and volunteers. The responders on the committee were alerted to the break-in at 1.15 a.m. and spent much of the rest of the night on site dealing with the police and CID. Anne, Jeanette, Gordon and a number of volunteers spent all of the following morning cleaning up the mess and Clive has spent many hours repairing the damage in order to make the shop secure until we can get a specialist to fit a new door frame. Thanks to the efforts of staff and volunteers, the shop was up and running again within 24 hours.

This was the third attempt to steal from the Post Office (two burglaries and one daylight armed robbery) in the last three years, so the committee now needs to decide what is the best way forward.

Despite the setbacks, the Shop continues to serve the community. The shelves are full, fresh fruit and vegetables arrive almost every day and Digby has to top up the wine shelves with embarrassing frequency. As you know we like to ring the changes with wine so do keep your eye on the shelves for new lines over the next few weeks.

Colin Russell's lovely Sulgrave honey is back on the shelves and we have a good stock of the fabulous Te Souka Moroccan spices and sauces – so please support our home grown producers.

Don't forget that it is Mothering Sunday on 27<sup>th</sup> March when you can be sure that there will be good stocks of fizz and chocolates on the shelves.

Amongst them was Tony Keatley, a keen Bonsai tree grower since the 80's who agreed to be the speaker at our last meeting on 21<sup>st</sup> February. #### FEBRUARY ON THE FARM (2022)

Forty days after Christmas is Candlemas day the 2nd of February, and there is a saying in farming, that says a prudent farmer should have "Half his hay on Candlemas day." A reminder that while Spring will soon be with us, it can still be some time before livestock can feed off grass alone.

The effect of winter weather on Autumn sown crops can be seen especially in barley at this time of year. It starts to go yellow which is nothing to worry about if you are the grower, as an application of nitrogen fertiliser as soon as the weather permits, will green the leaves up. Nitrogen is essential for the growth of all crops and has a significant contribution to yield. It has become an expensive input, now 250% more than two years ago, so is used carefully in the crops management.

On the land up Barrow hill and along the Weston Rd, hedges are being laid in the traditional way, before stock fencing is put up. In places along the roadside the hedge has been cut off at ground level. This is for a very good reason, as the hedge was weak and thin. By cutting it back hard, it will now shoot out at base and with the planting of some new plants between the stumps, a much improved boundary hedge will be seen in a few years.

Mechanical hedge trimming finishes on the 28th of February, for the obvious reason of bird nesting and what is noticeable is the high standard to which it is done by local farmers and contractors. Maintaining a hedge takes skill and precision, and the value of hedges and the way they shape our countryside has been emphasised by the destruction by HS2 of great lengths of hedgerow, opening up long vistas and exposing buildings and houses previously hidden from view.

So much to do with the management of the countryside has to be viewed in the long term, an attribute not always apparent in Government policy. We are entering a new phase in agriculture policy after our exit from Europe, with many organisations wanting a say in our land management, and we will see in our own parish the effects of those policy changes in time.

Finally a quote from a past village character. When told of the death of a contemporary he replied. "That's funny, he's never done that before".

#### DONALD TAYLOR

It is my sad task to record the death of Donald Taylor, who was born in the village in 1929 and except during his army career lived here all his life. He was 92 in December last and until his death he was my eldest remaining relative in the village.

He spent his boyhood at the family farm (Mill Farm, Sulgrave). During the war years he attended Banbury Grammar School and not long after the end of the war in 1945 he embarked on a career as a regular soldier in the Army Intelligence Corps, serving mainly in Austria.

After more than ten years of important interviewing and recording work in and around Graz – a part of Europe then in post war turmoil - he left the army and returned to the family farm in Sulgrave.

He married Biddy not long after his return and their son Paul was born in 1958.

He had a keen interest in vintage agricultural machinery and with his 1955 Ferguson took part in many ploughing competitions in the village and elsewhere.

In the seventies and eighties he was a patient and kindly driving instructor and quite a few people in the village owe their early success with the driving test to him.

He was an active member of the local branch of the British Legion for many years and often acted as standard bearer at Remembrance Ceremonies. Villagers will remember his smartly dressed appearances around the village, selling poppies in the weeks before Remembrance Sunday (see opposite).

From time to time he also acted as quiz master at the Star Inn, having set the questions himself, usually with a military theme.

He was the custodian of numerous fascinating stories about the village, many of which he recorded for the Oral History Project and produced as illustrated articles for the village website. His father had been the commanding officer of the village home guard and as a regular soldier he reckoned they were "far from dad's army" and "would have given a good account of themselves"!

The funeral will be held in Sulgrave Church at 12 noon on Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> March and those attending are cordially invited to join the mourners at the Star Inn afterwards.

Family flowers only but if anyone wishes to make a charitable donation this would be greatly appreciated and shared between the British Legion and Air Ambulance.

A more comprehensive appreciation of Donald's long life, with illustrations, will appear on the village website after the funeral.

# Summary of Parish Council Meeting held at Sulgrave Village Church Hall on Thursday 6th January 2022

The Chairman welcomed to the meeting Mr Nigel Bowles, Chair of the Sulgrave Manor Board, along with two trustees, Mr Clive Preston and Mr William Twiday

In his opening statement the Parish Council Chairman reminded them of the Parish's objection to the proposed development of Kiln farm in its present form, the village's embarrassment with the two derelict cottages, and the lack of co operation between The Manor and village.

A power point presentation was then given by the trustees, showing the financial situation, their obligations as trustees and reasons for the development. Some good questions were then asked of them, but no movement in their position on planning was forthcoming.

#### Other points on the agenda.

Allotment hedge to be discussed.

Precept for next year to rise by 3%. Basketball hoops bought and paid for by Sulgrave Charity. Mr Nick Jackson making backboards.

The Chairman thanked Sarah Garnet for organising and making of the sixteen wreaths, that were hung round the village. Also Danny Webster and all those who helped him, in organising the Winter fair, which raised in excess of £1600.

Castle Green committee to organise Platinum celebrations.

Clerk to report poor road repairs not long done in Magpie road.

#### Summary of Parish Council Meeting held at the Village Church Hall on Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> February 2022

All Parish Councillors were present, together with Councillor Alison Eastwood of West Northants Council and eight villagers.

Matters discussed:

#### Sulgrave Manor

The Chairman, Councillor Fonge and Councillor Will Priestman had met with Alison Ray, C.E.O of the Manor and Trustee Clive Preston. Councillor Priestman reported that the Manor was now selling the two thatched houses with Kiln Farm Yard as one development lot. The Wool House is on the market but there is no movement on the size of the houses proposed for the Kiln Farm development. However, lines of communication between the Parish Council and Manor are now ongoing.

#### New Planning Application for Housing Development at Kiln Farm

This had been submitted with a business plan two days earlier. The Chairman explained that the application only differed from the previous one in small detail, whilst the business plan set out in full the reasons for the use of the Enabling Act to justify the granting of planning permission which was otherwise likely to be refused. The plan also emphasised the limited opportunities which the Manor had in raising income from events so as to provide it with long term security.

West Northants Councillor Eastwood had met with her Council's Planning Officer as a result of which she advised the Parish Council to take professional advice on this matter.

After some positive comments from members of the public attending, it was agreed that as many letters of concern as possible should be submitted to West Northants Council by the deadline of 22<sup>nd</sup> February.

It was further agreed that the Parish Council would meet again on 17th February.

#### Pocket Park

Councillor Fonge reported that Andrew Osmond had cut back the overhanging tree by the pond, and felled the dead oak in the woodland area, caused by squirrel damage to the bark. The new fencing posts were ready to be put in and the kissing gate had been strengthened.

#### High Speed Rail (HS2)

Councillor Staples reported that electric cabling was being laid for traffic lights on the main road to Thorpe Mandeville to be installed when the road strengthening takes place.

HS2 Contractor's representative to be invited to a future Parish Council meeting.

#### Dog Waste Bins

These are becoming increasingly onerous for the volunteers to deal with and the Clerk was asked to ascertain the cost of having these emptied by the local council.

#### Sulgrave Village Shop.

Councillor Staples reported upon the matter of the shop lease and all were agreed on a new ten year lease.

#### Litter

The Annual Village Litter Picking Day was agreed for Saturday March 26<sup>th</sup> at 10.00 am. Meet at the Village Church Hall Car Park. The Best Kept Village Competition had been entered.

#### Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations.

Plans for the picnic on Castle Green and Castle Hill had been advertised by the Castle Green Committee, with a meeting in the Star planned for 10<sup>th</sup> February to progress the matter further.

The Meeting closed at 8.30 pm.
