Taking over from Neil Johnston, who filled the role for over 15 years is a somewhat daunting prospect, but equally it is a huge privilege to get involved in this amazingly successful and much-valued enterprise.

We have lived at Rectory Farm for over 30 years. Most people will probably know my wife Joanna, better than me as she has been involved volunteering for the shop in many different ways since its foundation 18 years ago, but because of that it has always played a large part in my life as well and I understand the vital role it plays in the life of our village. I also have huge respect for the formidable team of volunteers who tirelessly support Jai in the day to day running of the shop, serving behind the counter but also buying stock, collecting vegetables from Helmdon, putting together the amazing selection of wine we offer and continuously stocking the shelves, quite apart from providing the warm welcome we all expect when we go in to buy something. Having done a few sessions behind the till myself in recent months I know how rewarding it can be. Mel Kirkpatrick manages the volunteer rota and is always looking for new candidates to enable her to spread the load as widely as possible, so please put your name forward to her if you feel you might be able to help, if only occasionally. It is not complicated, there are always two people on each shift so you will never be alone in the shop and you will always be supported.

Alongside the day to day activities there is the management committee, of which I am now Chairman. Our role is to oversee the business and financial management aspects and this has undoubtedly been key to the shop's success over the last 18 years. We have been particularly lucky to have had the expertise of Robin Prior since its inception and it is largely due to him that we have such solid financial and commercial foundations. However, as noted by Robin in last month's newsletter, we do now need to look to the future and we need people with relevant expertise to join us on the Committee to maintain this legacy. By any standards the Sulgrave Village Shop is a very small business with two part-time employees and a dedicated and knowledgeable team of volunteers, so we are not asking for a major time commitment. It is relevant expertise we need in the areas of financial management, HR, company secretarial and operational supervision in order to keep us on the sound footing we have always prided ourselves on maintaining. <u>WOW</u> where do we start with updating you on everything that has happened since the last Sulgrave News edition? With thanks to the lovely Lisa for letting us have extra space I think we should start with the last trip (now being known as Trip 1) We have a lot to fill you in on.

As many of you are aware The Star drivers left at 3.30am on Friday 27<sup>th</sup> January for their 5 day trip to Lviv in Ukraine with the 2 vehicles purchased from our fundraising events, plus customers just willing to donate to the pot and buy raffle tickets. The vehicles were also full of donated aid. For those of you who attended the 'Driver's Ukraine Talk' on the 10<sup>th</sup> February you already know from the videos and photographs shown (with thanks to Tony) why they wish to carry on helping Ukraine.

The convoy was welcomed through every step of their journey but most of all the welcome they received in Ukraine will stay with them forever. They were welcomed into a Ukrainian home where all 11 drivers were provided with a meal, the children had baked cakes for them. The Ukrainian family and their extended family were extremely thankful and spent the evening talking about the Ukrainians need to carry on with as much normality as possible. The evening had many stand up and toast moments 'Slava Ukraine' with their homemade Honey Vodka which I hear Tony was rather partial to, but I won't fill you in anymore on that particular part. We have an display a Ukraine Flag that was gifted and signed by the Ukraine family.. Some of you may have noticed that the flag has been signed upside down, this is not a mistake. When a flag is presented upside down it symbolises a country in distress! They were shown around Lviv and all the drivers will not forget the noise and the smell of all of the donated generators that were keeping the shops open in what we would call here a 'High Street'. The drivers also attended a Military Funeral and saw for themselves the Churches which were filled with the soldier's photographs that have lost their lives, with poignant and upsetting messages from their children missing their Daddies. It is unbelievable.... their resilience and how they try to carry on as normal. Many of you saw the photos and the video of the funeral when you attended the Driver's Talk

I think those of you who do not know already can probably guess that the drivers are keen to go back and help again. If you attended the Driver's Talk I am sure many of you have seen for yourselves why. James from Hook Norton Brewery paid a welcomed surprise visit and also thanked everyone for their kindness and generosity. James is very surprised how 1 pub in a small village has managed to pull people together and achieve so much between us. We have had much help from our customers in Sulgrave, surrounding villages as well as Brackley and Banbury. Together we have stood and never given up on what we all set out to achieve... We thank you all for getting involved and supporting Ukraine... We could not achieve this without you.

It was lovely to see some representatives from Eydon village at the talk, who have been very keen to support Ukraine but had no idea how and the best way. We have the contacts through Magda (The Old Debenhams), who we have been working alongside now for almost 1 year, Hook

Norton Brewery and now the experience of actually going to Ukraine already. So, if you, like Eydon, would like to fundraise on your own and then pull together the resources we can achieve so much more. Eydon are planning a fundraising event on **Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> March**. I have no further details at the time this goes to print. Maybe you would like to get involved with your school, workplace or just attend a car boot, every penny really does count and is gratefully received. #### YES WE ARE - Lets talk about 'TRIP 2'


Things have moved amazingly quickly since the Driver's Talk. The plan originally was to hopefully head back to Ukraine in May with fundraising being pushed again for vehicles and aid. However, an email from James and a call out for help from Magda, 2 days before the talk, has meant that Trip 2 has now been moved to the end of March. We originally thought how on earth are we going to achieve this? THEN 2 totally astonishing things happened. The first was Paul (as many of you know as 1 of the drivers). Paul's brother 'John' had heard what Paul and the other 10 drivers had achieved and decided he wanted to help. John lives in New Zealand and amazingly decided to donate enough funds for 1 vehicle. Paul, as well as everyone here will understand how much difference this will make. This made us realise maybe we could achieve this with your help? You certainly proved us right we raised a fantastic amount of money at the Driver's Talk night, a generous welcomed donation from my 91 year old Nan and many more donations from our customers over a busy weekend. We then suddenly had enough funds to purchase 2 vehicles TRULY FANTASTIC and we still cannot quite believe it. THANK YOU

As you know we were closed for 4 days during half term and this time was used to source 2 vehicles... Easy you may think but you would be wrong! The prices of vehicles has gone sky high, therefore it takes many hours to source the right vehicles for the right price. . You also have to be very careful as there are many scam sellers of vehicles out there at the moment! However, with thanks to a lovely lady in Devon and a day trip by Steve and Nigel to Devon, the 1st vehicle was purchased. Many of you know my eldest daughter Chloe. Chloe managed to source another vehicle luckily closer to home in Northampton through word of mouth, before it was advertised. This is John's vehicle. Meaning we now have 2 pick up trucks at The Star. Both vehicles need a little Steve TLC as well as Graham getting involved (I think he knows about this, if not, he does now ) They will then be good to go. The 2nd vehicle will obviously be going out to Ukraine with not only the Ukraine and British Flags but will also be displaying the New Zealand flag of course for John.

Unfortunately, this does not mean we are all set and ready to go! We have got some funds left to get the vehicles out to Ukraine BUT we are £600 short. We will be continuing to shake the pot and welcome donations right up until they go. The vehicles have to be purchased as a priority, firstly due to the documentation needed, and then the admin process completed by Magda to export them. Ukraine contacts are also informed and each vehicle is allocated to where it is needed most before they even arrive. Everything must be done properly!

Unfortunately, also due to the trip now being in March instead of Ma, Paul is unable to join the other drivers on this trip... He will be greatly missed, but will no doubt head out again at some point. Luckily, we have found another driver to replace Paul on the trip and Richard, Tony's Son in Law, who spends a lot of time in the village and has attended many of the Ukraine fundraising events held here at The Star, will be joining the expedition.

As you all know The Star is run with an extremely small dedicated team. Therefore, once Steve has been out in March it will be impossible for him to head back out to Ukraine again before the autumn, due to The Star's busier season. This will not stop us fundraising going forward and achieving things from this end.

# March on the Farm



Aconites up the Moreton Road

February *filldyke* is the saying, meaning it's the month of rain filling up our ditches. This year we have had very little rain in February, with the ground relatively dry. Firm enough for some early spring operations with tractors to take place.

Early applications of nitrogen have been applied to some of the winter sown crops, and up the concrete road it looks to me that the black grass I noted last month has been sprayed with roundup. Those fields on both sides of the road were cultivated to form a "false seedbed" last autumn. This fine tilth of soil allowed a good germination of the black grass seeds. A good control of the grass now will allow the spring crop sown, whatever it might be, to grow without the competition of this weed which stifles the crop and reduces yield considerably.

Whilst on the subject of weed control, I would like to put into perspective the use of sprays in agriculture, the industry that feeds us. Herbicides are used to control weeds so that the crop can grow without competition. Fungicides are used to keep the leaf clean of the many diseases that attack the plant. A clean green leaf allows photosynthesis to take place to an optimum, thereby producing a good fruit. Insecticides, contrary to many reports are only applied when absolutely necessary. The control of flea beetle in Oilseed rape being the main one... I can assure one and all that Farm Assurance Schemes monitor the use of all these applications very diligently, and the cost per acre alone means that any spray is only used when needed.

On the top Stuchbury footpath an electric fence has been put up to hold a flock of sheep in. They are grazing the autumn sown grass down before maize is planted in April. Sadly, despite many reminders from farm organisations, sheep and cattle worrying by dogs is on the increase. As recently as last autumn a sheep in our parish was mauled to death. It is essential to have control of the dog at all times.

It is great to hear the woodpecker tapping away, and it is wondrous how the hole they make is so perfectly round. On another nature note, the aconites up the Moreton road are still in flower, some five weeks after first appearing. I am sure this is due to the many hard frosts we have had, making our winter weather as it should be. These successions of hard frosts do a great deal of good, especially to the earth. Take note of how easily the soil breaks down after being dug in the early winter.

Cold weather and outdoor work used to be a recipe for chilblains. An old and effective remedy was to make an ointment from the elderflower.

# Sulgrave Camera Club

There are a number of software options available, including free to use software but one of the more popular photo processing solutions is Adobe Lightroom, a subscription service which provides Lightroom as a processing suite and Photoshop as an editing suite.

Hi.


My name is Tim, and I am the founder of Gascoigne farm, a small market garden based here in Sulgrave.

All the seasonal vegetables are organically grown with no chemicals using the "no dig" method along with permaculture principles, to help create top quality soil and tasty produce.

My goal this year is to have produce ready to sell at the beginning of May and this should then continue through to October/November. However, this will be the first major year of growing so please bear with me as I work through this.

# "Weather Wise"

# Sulgrave's own weather station.

Sulgrave has had its own weather station right in the centre of the village for several years. Its' "live data" is posted every two minutes, wirelessly, via our broadband router in the house, to a host



website in the USA, where it can be seen by any visitor from around the world. Your Editor thought it might be useful and interesting to talk about the weather!

The Sulgrave website, (www.sulgrave.org.uk), relays the current local weather stats. These are shown on the grey data patch on the "homepage".

"Clicking" on the bottom line of the patch "extended forecast" - switches you to the main
dashboard of Sulgrave's weather station website,
opening up almost endless possibilities of seeing
what will be happening in the 10 days ahead or
what has occurred in the previous weeks or
months.

If we look at the "history" for February 2023, we can see that very unusually, we have had almost

no rain in our immediate area. Just 1.01 mm, echoing Richard Fonge's comment, about our very dry fields.

For those using antique barometers, 1 inch of mercury = 33.77 hPa!

The main website "dashboard" also shows a forecast for the next ten days. From experience, it is usually very accurate for the first two to three days, but gets less so as we move further ahead. It is known as a "personal weather station" or "PWS".

The host website, "weather underground", manages over 250,000 around the world! The Sulgrave PWS is a "Davis Wireless Vantage Pro2 ISS".

Incidentally, if you are about to go on your travels, you can search for a local PWS for your destination, to see what is about to occur when you arrive. Do you really need to take your umbrella or that thick sweater?
