“THE GENTLE CRAFT OF GRAVE TENDING”

‘A gentle craft, carried out by gentle people in gentle surroundings’ would be my summing up of Grave Tending, a niche industry which is slowly but surely growing in the U.K.

The idea is to clean and restore graves and headstones in a non-destructive manner (i.e. no sand blasting!), using environmentally friendly products as far as possible and doing so in as gentle way as is feasible.

No matter what I do, I can never return the stone to its original state, as constant exposure to the weather and the environment will inevitably weather and age it, but it is certainly possible to return it to a condition that a customer ‘can be proud of’, as one of my clients said to me.

Those sorts of feelings are always in my thoughts when I'm working for a client and cleaning their loved one's resting place – I'm acutely aware of their investment in feelings, time, money and memories, hence the name of my company Memories Grave Tending.

It's safe to say that Grave Tending is not widely known in the Dioceses of St. Albans and Oxford, the 2 areas which I cover.

Although there's no authentic history of the trade, I think it's safe to say it has its roots in Eire, with its centuries old tradition of 'Cemetery Sunday'. This was an annual day, usually in the summer, where graves were garlanded and decorated, but has slowly but surely morphed into a day of remembrance, flower laying and grave cleaning.

There's an apocryphal, but amusing story, which says it was a side line for Council cemetery workers. It's said they'd be tipped a few quid by mourners or relatives to look after the grave, a process which happily continued for many years until Council managers found out that the workers were spending half their time, and using the Council's tools to carry out their profitable side line in working hours. Needless to say, this brought an abrupt halt to the practice!

Back to reality, it's certainly a well-established trade in Ireland, with even small towns having several firms. A blogger writing on the subject said that the Roman Catholic community had far more 'flamboyant' graves and were far more likely to use their services than their more austere Presbyterian counterparts.

Interestingly the biggest firms in England tend to be in the North West/Merseyside, areas with a long history of Irish immigration. Having said that the sector has spread throughout much of the U.K. to the extent that there is now a national Association of Grave Tenders (of which I am proud to say, I am a member of) www.associationofgravetenders.org which encourages best practice, professionalism and environmentally friendly processes.

Many of the best practises are taken from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (www.cwgc.org), which it would be remiss of me to ignore. They are a wonderful organisation, which somehow manages to maintain 1.75 million graves over 23,000 burial sites in

153 countries, all in impeccable condition. If it's good enough for them then it's good enough for me!

I think this gradual expansion has to do with 2 trends, namely longevity and mobility.

Turning first to longevity – we are all living longer, and youngsters today will usually spend many years knowing their grandparents and even great grandparents. This just didn't happen 50-75 years ago. and means that today's generation have, in my humble opinion, a far more intense bond to their grandparents. This results in work for me (!), as they don't want their much-loved relatives to be forgotten or neglected.

This latter point feeds into the second trend, namely the increased mobility of families in the last 50-75 years. So many people now move away from their birthplace for work or University etc. but still feel a connection to their family's historical base. They are obviously unable to tend their relative's graves and so the need for someone to do it for them.


So why do I do it? Primarily it gives me huge job satisfaction, something I hadn't had for years. It's also very rewarding, seeing the results of my endeavours and hearing/reading the positive, and sometimes very moving, reactions from my clients. I enjoy running my own business and I love the environment; graveyards are very peaceful, beautiful places which are a joy to work in. Add in the fact that there's no pressure or deadlines, that my clients are lovely people and I've always been interested in churches and local history I think it's safe to say I've got the perfect job!

I hope I've shone a light on a niche sector that my friends and acquaintances are generally fascinated by.

We are getting tired of talking about the dreadful weather – so we shan't. Fingers crossed that things will change come September and that we shall have what we used to call an Indian Summer.

The shop remains as busy as ever and we continue to do our best to avoid running out of essentials though, from time to time, items we have ordered don't turn up.

As with many products, the purchase prices of some of our wines have gone up substantially over the past few months. You may also have heard that, from August, the duty on most alcoholic drinks has been increased. This means that most bottles of wine will cost 44p more per bottle, beers and cider above 4.5% ABV will increase by 1p a can and spirits such as Vodka will increase by 81p per bottle. Sorry chaps but this is all supposed to be good for your health! We do our best to keep our booze prices as low as possible but I am afraid some of these purchase price increases will have to be passed on.

Some good news on the wine front is that we have managed to get another consignment of the excellent 'Les Chefs de l'Enclave' rosé. This has been given a firm thumbs up by the pink drinkers of the village - so grab a few bottles while you can. It usually retails at £9.95 a bottle so the shop price of £7.45 is a bargain.

I am afraid we have had to change the date of the Shop AGM to fit in with committee members' availability. Summer holidays always get in the way of planning. So, the new date for the Shop AGM is 20th September at 7.30 in the Village Hall. All the information in last month's newsletter and the message that everyone is welcome still applies. Please do your best to

attend. You will also be offered a glass of wine and a few nibbles if you join us.

We are expecting delivery of a new range of greetings cards so do keep your eyes on the racks.

"Weather Wise"

Facts and figures from Sulgrave's own weather station.


(17 July 2023 - 18 August 2023)

Intro. (For new readers of the "Village Newsletter").

Your Editor thought it would be interesting to talk about the weather! After all, it is the subject we often choose to talk about when we want to break the ice! Sulgrave has had its own weather station in the centre of the village for several years. Its' "live data" is posted every two or three minutes, wirelessly, via the internet, to a host website in the USA, where it can be seen by any visitor from around the world.

The Sulgrave village website, (www.sulgrave.org.uk), has a grey "patch" on its homepage, which shows the key points of this "live weather data".

Clicking on the patch's bottom line - "extended forecast" - switches you to the main dashboard of Sulgrave's weather station website, opening up an almost endless array of weather data. It shows what will be happening in the next 10 days from Sulgrave's perspective and what has occurred in the previous weeks, month or years.



17 July - 18 August 2023.

According to the MetOffice, "**The UK had the 6th wettest July since 1835.**".

We had 170% more rain in July, than the average for the same month during 1991 - 2020, and 210% more during the thirty year period before that! (Ref: MetOffice report for July 2023).

Browsing through the MetOffice's various monthly and annual reports, I found an archive of monthly regional recordings stretching back to 1873 - 150 years! In there I discovered the monthly rainfall records for our Central region,.

Unbelievably, last month was the 6th wettest July in the UK's Central region since 1873. We've only had three other "wetter Julys" since 1922!

Central Region' had a mean of 107 mm in July. We measured 109 mm in Sulgrave, so we are comparable with the MetOffice's rain gauges!

The mean temperature last month for Central England, was just 0.6 degs C lower than the mean for the last thirty years, (1991 - 2020). No evidence of climate warming this year, but perhaps one of the effects - more rain!

So although we had a very warm beginning to July with the daytime temperature peaking at just over 28 degs C, it quickly became much cooler and wetter!

Out of interest Sulgrave's monthly rain falls have been:

May = 34.3 mm, June = 58.7 mm, July = 109 mm, August so far = 36.6 mm

By the way, 1 inch of mercury = 33.77 mBars, thus 30 inches of mercury = 1013 mBars or 1013 hPa.

Sulgrave weather station website also shows a forecast for the coming ten days, which from experience, should only be relied upon for the first two to three days, becoming less accurate as we move further ahead, but it does provide a good general guide.

Incidentally, if you are about to go on your travels, you can search for a local "Personal Weather Station" (PWS) for your destination, to see what is about to occur when you arrive. Do you really need to take your umbrella or that thick sweater?

AUGUST ON THE FARM (2023)

The month of August is the main harvest month, and this year like many in the past it has been, so far, a month of poor weather for both farmers and holiday makers. When there are short spells of fine sunny days it is essential to be able to harvest as much as possible, but it also means that the Farmer cannot wait for the grain to dry naturally to the 14% required for storage, hence it has to be dried artificially, increasing the cost of production, not cheap at today's energy prices, unless solar panels have been installed on the grain store.

August 1st is Lamass day in the Church calendar. On Lamass day in years gone by when a village like Sulgrave was very dependent on a good harvest, a loaf of bread was blessed in the Church as a prelude to the harvest. This ritual is still observed by a friend of mine at their Church in Warwickshire.

Observing the crops around the village, the wheat looks as if it will yield well, as has the barley this year. The spring barley up the concrete road which has suffered from the heavy storms

more than most, now needs fair weather to ripen off and yield well.

A comparison.... Sixty years ago, wheat yielded 1.5 tonnes /acre on average and ten acres a day could be harvested... 15 tonnes a day. Today 3.5 tonnes and eighty acres a day harvested. 275 tonnes a day.

Last month I referred to Banbury Market and how it was a stockyard of England. It seems incredible to think today but stock was driven through the streets of Grimsbury to grazing on the fields up Overthorpe Hill. Once a month there would be a consignment of cattle from Ireland, which would come by train from Holyhead straight to the market and then to those fields, before their sale to local farmers.

Markets provided not only a place for farmers to do business, but also a place to share experiences and socialise. So important when often living on a lone holding. Today so few are involved in the industry, due to the great advances in technology and specialisation that loneliness is a problem.

People used to whistle when working, a sound not often heard now. Indeed, those of us of a certain age can remember a radio programme on the Light Wave called "Whistle while you work". The light wave became Radio 2 in the late sixties.

Looking forward rather than back, the hedgerow harvest looks promising, with plenty of blackberries ripening, crab apple trees laden to the limit, and plenty of sloes for the gin, particularly along the old railway line.







Music slots are full – The music is varied – Something for everyone – The Hooky Lorry will be their stage




