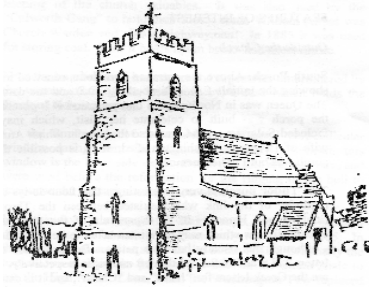
Brackley Nova are an established cycle club from the surrounding area and we are looking for new members.

"Weather Wise"

Facts and figures from Sulgrave's own weather station.

(19 February 2024 - 23 March 2024)

Intro. (For new readers of "**Sulgrave News**").

Your Editor thought it would be interesting to talk about the weather! After all, it is the subject we often choose when we want to break the ice!

Sulgrave has had its own weather station in the centre of the village for several years. Its "live data" is posted every two or three minutes, wirelessly, via the internet, to a host website in the USA, where it can be seen by any visitor from around the world.

The Sulgrave village website (www.sulgrave.org.uk) has a grey "patch" on its homepage, which shows the key points of this "live weather data".

Clicking on the patch's bottom line "extended forecast" switches you to the main dashboard of Sulgrave's weather station website, opening up an almost endless array of weather data. It shows what will be happening in the next 10 days from Sulgrave's perspective and what has occurred in the previous weeks, month or years

It's worth noting that the 30 year (1992-2021) average rainfall for February for the East Midlands is 35 - 55 mm, depending on the location.

**I did a quick calculation of what this means in every-day terms. If we take February's rainfall over a standard professional football pitch of 7140 sq metres, this would give us 892.5 cu meters of water - which is the typical annual usage for 90 homes! I wonder whether we will still have hose pipe bans this summer?

March 2024

Traditionally, March always began each new year until 1752 when we all changed to the present calendar.

March is derived from the Latin word *Martius* named after *Mars*, the Roman god of war, and was the name of the first month in the original Roman calendar. So Happy New year, if you are still living in the past.

The Ides of March, usually the 15th of our March, was a special date in the **Roman calendar** when the new year was celebrated, sacrifices were made to their gods, Romans paid their debts and for some their taxes as well! It is not a coincidence that the Government and many organisations still use the end of March for the closing of the financial year.

The founder of our present calendar, Julius Caesar, was murdered, in the Roman senate, on the Ides of march in 44 BCE, two years after the introduction of the calendar.

Total rainfall in Sulgrave for the last six months of 2023 was *448mm*. For the same period in *2022 it was 233 mm*.

For reference, units for measuring atmospheric pressure:
1 inch of mercury = 33.77 mBars, thus 30 inches of mercury = 1013 mBars or 1013 hPa.

Richard Fonge writes:

It's nice to have some drying weather after what has been one of the wettest of late autumns and winters for many a year.

The fertiliser spreaders have been out applying much needed nitrogen to the winter sown crops. The oilseed rape off the Magpie Road will soon grow at a pace and be coming out in flower before the month is out. Some of the wheat on the Stuchbury footpath is suffering from the incessant wet and it will be interesting to see how well it recovers, whilst the fields up the concrete road which were cultivated last autumn will take sometime to dry out before they can be planted.

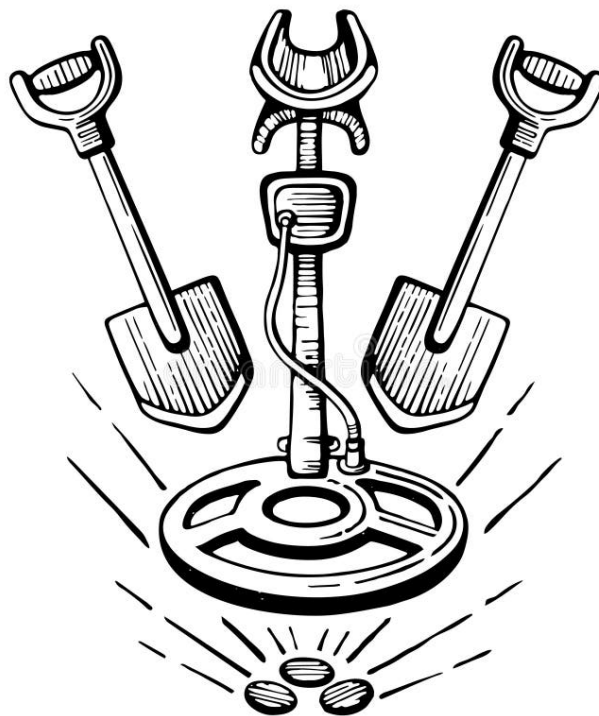
All fields have names, most of them going back many generations. The field nearest the farm was usually called the dairy ground for the obvious reason as that is where the cows grazed. There are three fields in the Stuchbury Parish I can recall. Gallows field where the hangman's scaffold once stood. Washbrook where the stream at the bottom of the field has a sheep wash and Newpiece, so called as it was the last field to be cleared of woodland in the early nineteenth century.

Near to the new junction of the temporary road as it meets the Welsh lane was a triangular field of an acre, used by the drovers to rest their stock, such as there is at the Magpie junction.

That history has been destroyed by HS2 as have other field names, by developers. Field names tell you a lot about the former characters and history of the parish.

When farming I had a 25 acre field called mushroom after a sudden crop of mushrooms appeared many years previously, and in 1992 two metal detectorists found a horde of Roman coins dating from 79 AD to 210 AD. It was thought that a pot had been buried which had been broken by the plough and spread in a small area. The Coroner's court ruled they were not treasure trove but Warwick museum catalogued and kept most of them.

Apologies for Absence

Councillor Castle and Councillor Powell. Seven villagers present.

Sulgrave Manor - The Chairman reported that he and Councillor Staples had been to a reception at The Manor and had met the new Chair of the Trustees, Carole Souter CBE and other trustees as well as the two new members of staff.

HS2 (High Speed Rail) - Following the open meeting with HS2 where, quite rightly, much anger was expressed over extended road

closures, the Chair had had a meeting with the Contractors' two senior engagement officers, accompanied by Cllr Staples and Cllr Powell. Better communication was asked of them, and after a frank and open discussion, clearer lines of communication were agreed, with the offer from them of sponsorship towards the June Village Fete together with a further offer to match public spending on equipment costs in the Pocket Park. Council agreed to apply.

Village Newsletter- The Newsletter editor asked for guidance on the subject matter and extent of contributions. Council decided that there should be a two pages maximum per contributor whether business or individual. Clerk to put this in writing for future reference.

Summer Fete on Castle Green and Castle Hill.- A meeting of all interested parties was held on the 14th March. The date for the event was set for Saturday, June 8th. Brackley Brass Band and Morris Dancers to be present with evening entertainment. There will also be children's games and stalls.
