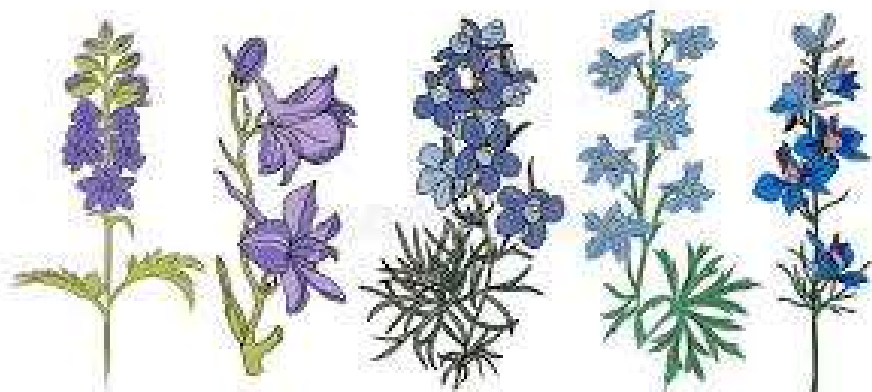

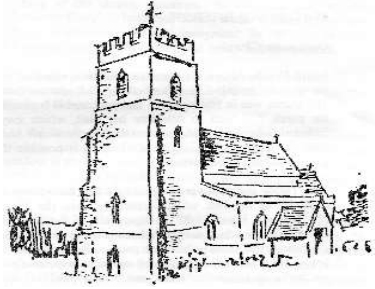

'Weather Wise'

Facts and figures from Sulgrave's own weather station.
(22 June - 19 July 2024)

Intro' for new readers of **Sulgrave News**.

Your Editor thought it would be interesting to talk about the weather! After all, it is the subject we often choose when we want to break the ice!

Sulgrave has had its own weather station in the centre of the village for several years. Its 'live data' is posted every two or three minutes, wirelessly, via the internet, to a host website in the USA, where it can be seen by any visitor from around the world.

The Sulgrave village website (www.sulgrave.org.uk) has a grey 'patch' on its homepage, which shows the key points of 'live weather data' for today, 22 June '24.

Clicking on the patch's bottom line 'extended forecast' switches you to the main dashboard of Sulgrave's weather station website, opening up an almost endless array of weather data. It shows what will be happening in the next 10 days from Sulgrave's perspective and what has occurred in the previous weeks, month or years



June 2024

Our month of June is named after the Roman goddess Juno, who was the wife of Jupiter, the king of the Roman gods. Jupiter's equivalent in Greek mythology was Zeus. Juno was the goddess of marriage and childbirth. I thought I might take to opportunity to catch up with our calendar months and bring us up date with July, named after our man Julius Caesar, who gave us the modified calendar we use today, apart from a tweak by Pope Gregory in the 16C which we in Britain implemented in the 18C.

What a difference a few weeks make! Just compare the figures above with those for April in last month's News.

Sulgrave's rainfall for the first five months of 2024 was 433.03 mm (250.7 mm in 2023). A 73% increase!

However we are not alone with our particularly wet spring. I found a few interesting facts for June in this week's *Spectator* magazine:

- In the summer of 1799 there were only eight dry days between 22 June and November of that year.
- On the 12 June 1910 severe hailstorms struck Britain with piles 3 ft deep in some places.
- In Bruton, Somerset they had 244 mm (9.6 in) of rain on 28 June 1917, which caused the River Brue to rise 6m (20ft) above its usual mean level.
- 3 June 1962 saw overnight temperatures in Norfolk drop to minus 6°C!
- Play in a county cricket match 2 June 1975 at Buxton, between Derbyshire and Lancashire was suspended because of a snow storm.

May's Question - the origin of the saying, "*the darling buds of May*"?

Answer: It's taken from Shakespeare's Sonnet XVIII, '*Shall I compare thee to a summer's day? ~~ Rough winds do shake the darling buds of May, etc.*' First printed in 1609.

For reference, units for measuring atmospheric pressure:

1 inch of mercury = 33.77 mBars, thus 30 inches of mercury = 1013 mBars or 1013 hPa.

**SUMMARY OF THE PARISH
COUNCIL MEETING
HELD IN THE VILLAGE HALL
ON THURSDAY 6TH JUNE 2024**



The Chair, Cllr Richard Fonge, opened the meeting with a moment's silence in remembrance of D Day (6th June 1944). It was important that the event was recorded in the minutes.

Co-option of New Parish Councillor.

The Chair welcomed Mrs Joanna Peppiatt to the Council, filling the vacancy for a Parish Councillor that had arisen from the resignation of Cllr Neil Higginson.

HS2 (High Speed Rail)

Cllr Sara Staples reported on HS2. The Radstone road will be closed from 17th June to 24th June. A villager was sure that the A43 would be closed at night the same week. Follow up required.
Cll Staples also reported that HS2 were not likely to match fund a project. She and Chair to investigate.

Sulgrave Manor

The Manor Road Cottage sales are still subject to contract.

The Village Summer Fete.

The Chair reported that all was in hand for the fete on Saturday 8th June. The marquee was up and ready for decoration.

He thanked all those who had sponsored the event to the tune of £2,240 which included the £1500 from HS2. The Council would be paying just over £300 to the expenses.

New Footpath Warden.

Paul Crowley has volunteered to take up the role of Footpath Warden from Graham Roberts. The Chair thanked Graham for not only his five years as warden but his twenty plus years as a councillor.

Finance

The Council approved the audited AGAR figures. Document signed by the Chair and will be displayed on the noticeboard outside the Village Shop.

Castle Green.

The Council agreed the quote from Jeff Ratley to repair wall.

Open Forum.

Comments from villagers present.

- There was a complaint of overgrown vegetation impeding visibility at the junction of new road through the HS2 site and B4525. Clerk to follow up.
- There was a request from the Village Shop Committee for information on new villagers.
- It was agreed that the Stars and Stripes will be flown from flagpole during visit from the Colonial Dames of America.

**CHAIRMAN’S REPORT TO THE ANNUAL GENERAL
MEETING OF SULGRAVE PARISH COUNCIL ON
THURSDAY 9TH MAY 2024**

The past year has been I believe one of quiet achievements. We started the year by celebrating the coronation of King Charles on Castle Green, with a village picnic lunch, in glorious weather. The Brackley brass band played and the green was covered with families and friends . Sulgrave enjoying themselves.

The previous day Caroline Grant had organised activities for the children including the hand printed flag you see hanging in the hall. Thank you Caroline and Nick for that special wet Saturday afternoon, and to Sulgrave Charities for sponsoring the children’s mugs.

The grass cutting has once again been done to a high standard by Luke Warren, and in the winter we accepted his quote to edge all the paths, for which many residents expressed their appreciation. My thanks to Cllr Neil Higginson for his work liaising with the contractors. Neil has had to resign from the Council and we wish him well. He will always be known as the “Grassmeister”. Cll Mike Powell has taken over.

HS2 has taken up much time, and thanks goes to Cllr Sara Staples for her work. The Marston road from the Magpie was closed for seven months (we were told a month originally). After a very fractious meeting in the hall in late February I arranged a meeting with the Chief Engagement Officer and his deputy. Along with Cllrs Staples and Powell we were able to secure £1500 towards the village fete and a promise of match funding towards a village project.

The V.A.S sign went up in Magpie road, which is definitely doing its job. Cllr Priestman’s patience was tested, in the length of time it took W.N.C to put the pole in, but he got there in the end.

Pocket park and woodland are used by many. Cllr Jen Castle has quotes in for new equipment, which will be discussed later.

Potholes continue to be a source of annoyance. The blocked land drain in Manor Road took some time to clear, but once Unitary Cllr Alison Eastwood was informed the problem was soon solved. Our thanks go to Alison for all her conscientious representations on our behalf and good advice.

The Manor has seen a change of trustees, with real hope that there is a fresh beginning in our relationship with them.

Thank you to Lisa Roberts for her editorship of the monthly newsletter. To Susan Sanderson for running the village library and Maureen Jeffrey for her care of the planter by Stockwell Lane.

My sincere thanks also to my fellow councillors for their unselfish work towards this lovely village of ours. We are a very much not only a team but a group of friends also, with that chemistry working for the greater good. My thanks also to those of you who regularly attend our meetings.

Finally may I on Sulgrave's behalf thank Christine our clerk of for her quiet but authoritative advice and guidance at all times, not least the weekly phone chats we have. We are very fortunate to live here and be part of a friendly community, so let us welcome all newcomers so that we can maintain that sense of friendliness and involvement.

JUNE ON THE FARM – 2024

We are four days away from the longest day and it feels more like winter at times. However we have had this type of June weather before and will do in the future. If you make your living from the land, as I did, you have to work and accept the weather you're given by nature. Just as you accept that life and death go with keeping livestock.

The late sown barley up the concrete road looks well but I suspect it will run to seed well before it should with a very reduced yield as a consequence. An exceptional crop of wheat sown last October after maize is up at Stuchbury in a field called Sulgrave ground at the exit from the footpath from Wemyss farm. This field I know from experience being of really good fertile soil always out yielding others on the farm.

The field growing maize next to it which leads down to the farm house was called the "Milkers field", but I found out recently it is now called Fonge's after my family who lived and farmed there as tenants of Balliol College Oxford from 1947 to 1975. Oxford and Cambridge colleges were large land owners and still are but less so now with assets moved into other investments.

At the magpie junction is a field of maize which runs along towards the new road. This crop will be harvested for animal feed, whereas the

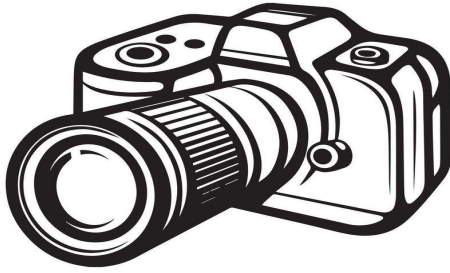
Stuchbury fields and those planted on the way to Banbury will be used to go into an anaerobic digester for energy production. This is the changing use of land from food production to energy, with also the growing number of solar farms. A sensible balance must be struck between the demands of green energy, nature conservation and food production.

Recently you may have been aware of large tractor and trailers coming through the village for several hours. They were carting fresh cut grass to be made into silage by heaping it into and tightly rolling it down in a clamp where it is sealed and then used as a winter feed for cattle.

We have just witnessed some very articulate D.Day veterans with their memories, and it reminded me of a gentleman I knew who died in 1993 at the age of 101, who could remember his elderly grandmother who was born in 1807 telling him a story from a soldier relative who had fought at Waterloo in 1815.
