

(18 May - 15 June 2025)

Intro' for new readers of Sulgrave News.

Your Editor thought it would be interesting to talk about the weather! After all, it is the subject we often choose when we want to break the ice!

Sulgrave has had its own weather station in the centre of the village for several years. Its 'live data' is posted every two or three minutes, wirelessly, via the internet, to a host website in the USA, where it can be seen by any visitor from around the world.

The Sulgrave village website (<u>www.sulgrave.org.uk</u>) has a grey 'patch' on its homepage, which shows the current 'live' summary of the weather.

The "Drought"?

No I don't think so. We eventually had almost four inches of rain in Sulgrave over the last six weeks. Not enough to catch-up to our normal rain fall levels at the end of spring. Dramatic photographs have appeared in the press showing very low levels in many of our reservoirs.

Richard Fonge in his "June on the Farm" article this month talks about the consequences of having had very low levels of rainfall this spring poor cereal yields and higher prices in the shops for all of us.

I've just watched the latest episodes of "Clarkson's Farm" on Prime Video tv, reminding me how wet during harvest last summer was for the farmers. Again causing very low yields resulting in higher prices at the shops.

However the *jet stream* seems to have moved back into its more normal summer pattern, allowing variable periods of dry followed by unsettled weather moving east across the UK from the Atlantic. It remains to be seen as to whether we will avoid having hosepipe bans later in the summer.

Out of interest I had a look at the Met Office's historical archive to see what had happened in previous July's of the last 20 years. (Within living memory - perhaps for some?):

- Highest ever recorded temperature in the UK 19 July 2022. 40.3°C at Coningsby, Lincolnshire.
- Very heavy rain. 115 mm at Brize Norton and 147 mm fell at Sudeley, Gloucestershire between 6.00am and 6.00pm on 20 July 2007. That is more rain in a 12 hour period than we have had in the last 12 weeks!
- Very high winds? In fact a level four tornado forced a 12 km long track through the east side of Birmingham's city centre on 28 July 2005, causing considerable damage to housing and trees.

Happy days in July? Fingers crossed!

JUNE ON THE FARM – 2025

Richard Fonge writes:

June has begun with much needed rain. All the grassland fields are looking very sparse and the corn whether sown in the winter or spring is desperate for rain. The forecasters have often said during this long dry sunny spring that growers and gardeners need some rain. That is true, but it is to all our benefit that we have enough rain to grow good crops - The farmer for his business and the consumer for the plentiful supply of food at reasonable cost.

It can be seen how short the crops are in length, and they have come to flowering or into ear much earlier, by a good two weeks at least.

There are two types of barley with many varieties within each type. The barley seen up the Moreton Rd and along the concrete road is feed type, used in the feeding of livestock mainly. The other type is malting barley for the brewing trade, more suited to the lighter, brashier soils of the Cotswolds for example. It needs slightly different management to reach the standards of the brewer. Minimum protein of 9.5% to 12%. for one.

Wheat can also be divided into three types. Off Park lane there is a small field of wheat which is being grown for animal feed, therefore a feed wheat. Milling wheat is another type, like the malting barley requiring different management to reach the bakers criteria.

Milling wheat commands a higher price, but has higher inputs and yields less than feed wheat. As a grower getting a contract with Warburtons is a premium for example.

The third wheat is durum mainly grown in Italy for the making of Pasta and macaroni, with semolina as a by-product.

Agricultural shows start throughout the country in May and go on till September. Whilst farming is at the heart of the show, with livestock and agricultural machinery to the fore, there are many other attractions, with stalls and entertainment. A great day out for all and an opportunity to get to know how the countryside works balancing the demands of farming, conservation, public access and sport.

Finally a Warwickshire farmer I knew was called Birchley Saunders. His three brothers were called: Ashley, Elmly and Oakley. Do you think there was another branch to the family?

Cllr Powell reported that the Banbury Lane (Culworth to Thorpe Mandeville) will be closed for three days from Wednesday 18th June. Bridge being put in place.

Councillors' Email Addresses

New email addresses required for all councillors and clerk by government. The village website also to have a government domain name. Colin Wootton agreed to seek advice and inform clerk.

Pocket Park.

Cllr Sarah Parker gave an upbeat report. She had had good feedback from her discussions with the young families in the village and hoped to be ready to present a submission to HS2 for funding by September. Council agreed with the concept that this was a community project. Cllr Peppiatt to report back to Hall committee on their request.

The Sulgrave Charities

The Trustees of The Sulgrave Charities invite applications for funding from Sulgrave residents only.

"On the 29th March 1700, John Timcocks willed £10 for the benefit of the poor in Sulgrave. The capital was to be invested and the interest distributed at the discretion of the trustees.

John Walker added £20 on 5th April 1715 under the same conditions. A gift of £2 by the 'parishoners of Sulgrave' on the 4th November 1717 brought the total to £32 which was used to purchase land in the parish of Helmdon. A rent charge of £3.4.0d was levied on the land to give the first regular income to the trust which was subsequently entitled 'Timcocks and Walkers gifts'" (recorded by the Charity Commissioners on 27th March 1759)

As with all the other bequests to the charities, the income remains the same to this day.

In 1977, a radical overhaul of the charities was instituted by the Charity Commissioners and this resulted in the various bequests from across the years being grouped under one of two headings.....

- 1. The Gardiners Education Charity with the underlying principle of providing funds to be used to provide education for the children of the parish.
 - In recent years this has resulted in donations being made to the local primary and secondary schools and used to purchase computers, books, chairs etc..... A long way from the sorts of purchases that were being made 300 years ago when 'the money was used to pay the salary for a

Schoolteacher to instruct ten poor children in reading, writing and casting accounts', but with the same principle in mind. Tools for starting an apprenticeship and even funding for some cricket kit are also examples of how the money has been used in more recent times.

2. A Relief in Need Scheme – A scheme designed with the underlying principle of helping those in need in the parish.
